"People loved it. I had people coming up to me at my table saying they followed my Facebook page, which I'd never had that happen before. It's very strange, and very uplifting, when you have people like

'yeah, I follow your Facebook page and I knew you were going to be here'. Like, OMG."

"My 2nd coloring book is called **Edify: A Black History Coloring Book** and that one actually won the **Best of Indy Award**."

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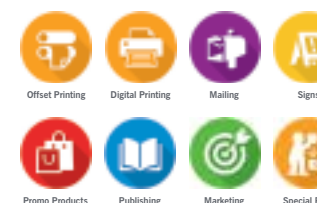


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Over A Century of Service

How Rotary Serves Hoosier Communities

Let me start off by saying, I am a Rotarian. I'm the President-Elect and Membership Committee Chair for the Indianapolis East Rotary Club. Rotary has inspired me to find new ways to meet needs right here in the community.

Rotary International started in Chicago, Illinois in 1905 with 4 friends who wanted to share ideas, build meaningful partnerships and give back to the community. By following the principal of 'Service Above Self,' Rotary has grown to 1.2 million members worldwide who serve their community, one project at a time.

It's been over 100 years since the first Rotary Club was chartered in Indiana. In fact, Indiana is home to some of Rotary's oldest clubs. Rotary's strong commitment to serving others in the community has made a meaningful impact on the lives of Hoosiers. These examples are only beginning to scratch the surface.

Indianapolis, Indiana Riley Children's Hospital



James Whitcomb Riley was a famous writer, poet and member of the Rotary Club of Indianapolis. When he died in 1916, fellow Rotarians from across Indiana helped start the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children in 1924 in his honor and raised \$276,000 to construct the Rotary Building, which served children with Polio. The original building still stands today at 702 Rotary Circle Indianapolis, Indiana 46202 as part of the IU School of Medicine on the campus of IUPUI.

Richmond, Indiana Starr Park Shelter

Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Richmond partnered with the Richmond Department of Parks and Recreation to help keep the park beautiful. Through a matching grant from the Rotary District 6560 Foundation, The Rotary Club of Richmond was able to build a new shelter at Starr Park, located at 315 N. 15th St Richmond, Indiana 47374.

Crown Point, Indiana Imagination Library

Started in 2016 by then Club President Katherine Chariton, The Crown Point Rotary Club and the Crown Point Community Foundation partnered with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to help 400 children in the community receive a free book every month. The Dolly Parton Imagination Library is a literacy program that sends children an age appropriate book every month from birth until the age of 5. 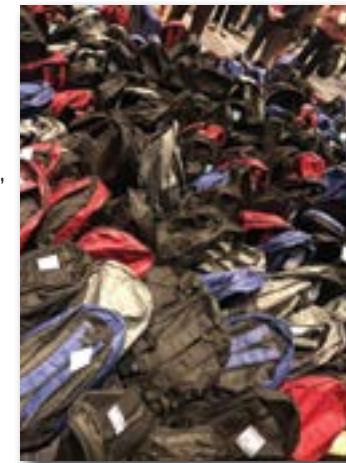
Evansville, Indiana Education Enrichment

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The Importance of Branding for Your Business

Creating a brand is more than just finding the perfect name and designing an awesome logo. Your brand is the heart of your business. A great brand represents the heart and soul of why you're in business, what you're passionate about and something that nobody else can be, uniquely you. To create your own effective brand, ask yourself these questions.

What are you passionate about?
